HEADTEACHER'S REFLECTION

Dear Parents, Students, and Staff,

Our commitment to Excellence in all we do remains at the forefront of our mission. This month, we have seen incredible achievements from our students, showcasing their talents and hard work. I am particularly proud of our Star Pupils, whose dedication and determination have set a wonderful example for all. A special mention to those students that were interviewed on Granada reports this week for Holocaust memorial day and represented our school in such a positive light. In line with our vision of Empowering an inclusive community based on Gospel Values, we have been actively promoting various initiatives that support our students' personal development. From extracurricular activities to community service projects, we are dedicated to providing a rich set of experiences that allow our students to thrive and grow. This week our local police teams delivered a session on 'Operation Prospect' to all year groups focusing on community violence and knife crime. While some of this was difficult to watch, we hope that students got a clear message on the challenges they face in the world today and how to avoid situations and get support should they need it.

I also want to highlight our ongoing efforts in improving attendance and reducing persistent absence across all groups. We believe that every day in school counts, and we are committed to ensuring that all students have the opportunity to learn and succeed. Poor punctuality to school and lessons is a real concern at the moment and I would ask for your support to ensure that these concerns are addressed. Students should be on the yard by 08:30 and in all lessons before the 5-minute late bell sounds. Students who fail to meet these expectations will be issued with a detention.

School has been buzzing today with parents and students from years 8 and 9 who are attending their review day. I hope that you all have managed to receive some positive comments and identified ways that you can continue to improve. Additionally, I would remind parents that attendance to school is a high priority backed by a high-profile Government agenda. While I understand that some parents may see letters sent regarding poor attendance as threatening and upsetting, these letters are the template letters provided by the LA and DFE. We are using a policy that has been ratified by a DfE representative. I would ask that you please support your child and school staff as much as possible to ensure that we continue to improve attendance for all pupils and narrow the gaps in learning that occur as a result of poor attendance.

I encourage you to engage with our school community through our social media platforms. We regularly share updates, photos, and important dates, ensuring that you stay informed about what's happening at St John Plessington. Luke 2 22-32

The Presentation of Our Lord

Who is God? What is he like? What does he do? Where can we find him? How can we see him? These are the questions everyone at some point asks. Some people expect God to be like a giant engineer in the sky, fixing and running things. Or perhaps a great King with a long beard sitting on a throne and making sure everything works out alright. Or a giant computer with a booming voice, like in a movie. Each person has their own imagined picture of what God must be like. And many people feel that they can't see God and that there is therefore little point in looking for him.

When Jesus was born, God came among us. But who noticed? When Mary and Joseph, being practicing Jews, brought him to the Temple to be initiated into his religion, they were so poor they could only pay for some doves to be sacrificed. The priests, the kings, the writers, the bankers, the teachers, the philosophers, the rich people, and the busy people. Not one of them noticed him. Everyone was looking in the wrong direction. They were so full of themselves that they did not really notice ANYTHING. They expected a king, a ruler, a powerful, mighty, even frightening person and leader. So they failed to notice. That is because God chose to be with us humbly. Jesus is humble. He does not shout, he does not come in a fancy It is normal for children to feel anxious sometimes. They may get a tummy ache or headache, or have problems eating or sleeping. Avoiding school can make a child's anxiety about going to school worse. It's good to talk about any worries they may have such as friendship problems, bullying, school work or sensory problems. You can also work with us to find ways to help them.


